**Appendix 1 – Chair of Almeley Parish Council Report**

The NDP has now got to the Referendum stage. This will be taking place on the 30<sup>th</sup> May 2019. All parishioners are encouraged to take part.

The sale of the Commons is the next big issue for the parish.

Due t the Localism Act the Parish Council is now expected to take on board a whole new set of responsibilities and liabilities and is now classified as a professional body. Over the last year has become increasingly aware of these new regulations. I wish to thank our clerk for all the work she has done to enable us to get through this process of change and comply with so many new requirements and liabilities.

The Parish Council is the voice of it's parishioners and it is therefore very important to see the community involved with parish matters. Please do therefore continue to attend meetings and share your views and suggestions.

## **Appendix 2 – Almeley Primary School Report:**

Almeley School and Little Elms Nursery have had another exciting and successful year. The Nursery having opened with only 3 children now has 18 children on the books and employs three staff. Last summer we extended the space available to the Nursery by making use of the old school house ground floor buildings and created a new outside play area. We have applied for a grant to make further alterations to improve the facilities.

The School was once again very successful academically with results in the top 25% in the country. Last year the School and Nursery were visited by HMI Ofsted for a short inspection and we received a glowing report that highlighted our many strengths. Short inspections can not change the school grading but it reconfirmed how well we are doing now and how well we have developed since our previous inspection in 2014.

We continue to provide the children with a range of different activities from local trips to farms and Forest Schools at Newport House, to residential trips and Historical trips etc. The school choir were runners up in the Herefordshire Small School Choir Festival and all pupils have enjoyed being part of class plays. We thank the Village Hall committee and other users for their support in enabling this to happen. All the children in class 2 and 3 have weekly instrumental lessons.

On the sporting front we have continued to provide a range of different opportunities. We have worked closely with coaches from Luctonians Sports Club, Mr Pete Gale from Worth Sports/Herefordshire County Cricket and more recently with Adam Jones (a parent) who works for Shrewsbury Town FC. We provide opportunities for all and run a number of after school clubs to support this as well as entering fixtures and festivals. Last Summer the School Girls Cricket Team became County Champions which is an incredible achievement for such a small school. We thank Almeley Cricket club for their ongoing support in maintaining the Common all year round for us.

We apologise for any inconvenience that the building work may be causing, but the contractors are progressing well with building us two new classrooms to replace the aging mobile classrooms. This will mean that all of our children will be taught in modern spacious facilities. With the Local authority investing in Almeley this is another sign that the school is performing well and should be here for many more years. The builders have promised to make good any land that they have disturbed on the edge of the Common. We hope to move into the new rooms ready for the new school year in September.

## **Appendix 4 – The Village Hall Report**

The hall continues to thrive, thanks to the hard working committee and support of local residents. It is regularly used by various clubs and groups as well as the local school and frequently booked for private functions. The committee have recently increased the hall hire charge, the first increase for around ten years, by £1 to £10 per hour.

The Committee and helpers got together to decorate the main hall during the school holidays and new curtains were purchased and hung. Thanks must go to Tim Ray for recently taking on the job of painting the reception area, bar area and toilets.

We had another successful Annual Village Fete and made a profit of around £1100 – our next fete will be held on Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> June 2019.

Our Sunday Lunches continue to be extremely popular and we regularly cater for around 60 diners.

Flicks in the Sticks continue to run on the third Thursday in the month and numbers attending vary from month to month.

Other successful fund raisers have been a hall quiz and ploughman's supper evening. A Christmas bingo evening, which was arranged between the hall and the school, also took place. All profits from this event were shared between the hall and the PTFA.

A recent risk assessment flagged up some electrical work that required updating and this has now been carried out.

The committee are currently working hard to secure a grant to replace the very old heating boiler, hot water tank and radiators.
